Birds are some of the most easily found animals on Earth — more than 11,000 species, ranging from a 2.25 g hummingbird to a 100 kg ostrich. This module lays the foundation: where birds came from, how they fit into the tree of life, and how to talk about them with anyone, anywhere.

1.1 Why birds matter

Birds occur in every habitat on Earth. They are visible, vocal, easy to find and rich in behaviour — which makes them the perfect entry point into the wild. Birding is now the fastest growing outdoor recreation in the USA, UK and Netherlands. In South Africa, the avi-tourism market is between 25,000 and 40,000 visitors annually.

1.2 What makes a bird a bird

Seven features in every bird: (1) feathers — the single unique feature shared by no other animal, (2) wings, (3) a beak, (4) two legs, (5) hollow bones, (6) warm-bloodedness, (7) hard-shelled eggs.

1.3 Bird evolution

Birds evolved from carnivorous Theropod dinosaurs in the Jurassic, 165–150 million years ago. *Archaeopteryx lithographica* ("ancient wing in stone") preserves both reptilian features (toothed beak, wing claws, bony tail) and avian features (asymmetric flight feathers).

1.4 Taxonomy

Kingdom → Phylum → Class → Order → Family → Genus → Species. Latin binomial naming (eg. *Lybius torquatus* = Black-collared Barbet) is universal. Modern birds split into Palaeognathae (ostrich, kiwi, tinamou) and Neognathae (everything else).

1.5 Morphology vocabulary

Morphology = the shape and form of a bird. The course returns again and again to topographical terms — crown, mantle, scapulars, vent, supercilium — because confident identification depends on confident vocabulary.

Theropoda	Carnivorous dinosaur group from which birds descend.
Archaeopteryx	150-million-year-old transitional fossil.
Palaeognathae	Ancient-jaw birds — ostrich, kiwi, tinamou.
